Jerre and Mary Joy were both raised in faith-based homes to be generous with their time, talents and treasure. If Jerre had 20 cents, he would save 10 and give 10 to his church. Their focus on helping others began at a young age and continues to this day.

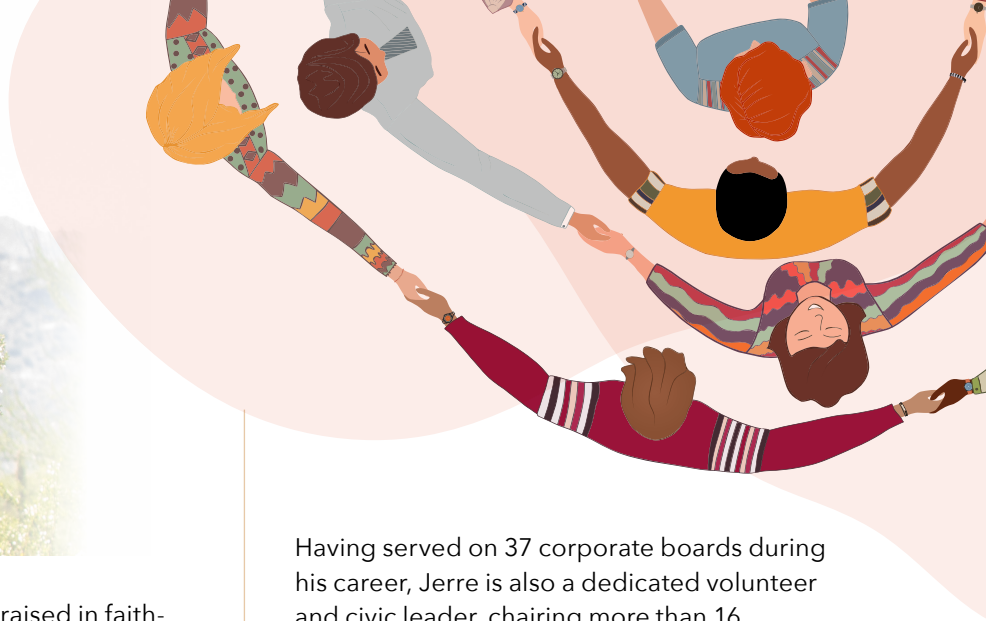
The young couple made a life-changing decision early on in their marriage to always do two things with their earnings: save and give.

In fact, Mary Joy remembers many frigid winter months when they lived in Minneapolis. The heating bills were so high that they didn't have enough money for savings. "But we always gave," she said.

Mary Joy's love of philanthropy and serving others was formed by watching her grandmother set aside money each week for her local church. That memory inspires her every day to keep a special place in her heart for the organizations and causes that have truly made a difference in her life.

Jerre is a visionary business leader and legendary big thinker, or as he would tell you, "a big believer." He's enjoyed the highest levels of success leading high-tech and information companies, most recently as Executive Chair and Chief Executive Officer of Clarivate, where he retired from his CEO role in September. Clarivate is the tenth public company in which he has served as CEO and/or Chairman.

"It's more about big believing than big thinking," said Jerre. "You need to believe that you can bend the curve and change the world. If we can get the world to understand and respect the important causes and issues that we all face every day, I believe change can happen."



Having served on 37 corporate boards during his career, Jerre is also a dedicated volunteer and civic leader, chairing more than 16 capital fundraising campaigns for nonprofit organizations. As a CEO for more than 42 years, Jerre says that the highlight of his career has always been to create and lead companies with instilled values for helping others.

When it comes to philanthropy, Jerre and Mary Joy focus on specific areas that are especially meaningful to them—creating leaders, research, education and religion. As Jerre notes, they're also committed to changing the momentum in the fight against Alzheimer's Disease, childhood obesity and mental illness.

"We've always been passionate about family, friends and good health," Mary Joy explains. "There is a joy in giving to organizations that serve as role models and that specialize in customer delight."

HONORHEALTH BECOMES PART OF THE FAMILY

Their introduction to HonorHealth, then Scottsdale Healthcare, came in 1997 when Mary Joy fell off a roof and suffered severe injuries. Despite nine successful surgeries, it was the simple service of blankets she was given to prevent her from going into shock when she first arrived at the hospital that left her with a warm impression of HonorHealth.

Years later, Mary Joy encountered an HonorHealth EKG technician who remembered her from past interactions. She believes it's the down-to-earth, family-oriented and caring staff that truly make HonorHealth stand out from the rest.

Jerre also experienced the kindness and compassion of HonorHealth staff after an

The Steads were drawn to the Institute’s mission to improve medicine and change the future. They recently committed to a generous \$5 million gift to establish the Stead Family Innovation Fund, which will give patients access to groundbreaking therapies and the latest medical devices, along with a great deal of much-needed hope.

With more than 220 active clinical trials and another 70 under review or consideration, the Institute is helping to advance the science needed to make breakthrough treatments a reality. The Steads admire this vision and drive to innovate.

HonorHealth was the first hospital in the United States to implant the Abbott leadless pacemaker as part of a clinical study on heart arrhythmia. The Institute also reviewed 110 COVID-19 study projects from around the world in 2020, then rapidly developed potentially lifesaving therapies less than a year later. More than 1,500 patients were treated through COVID-19 clinical trials. This rapid “bench to bedside” research is a hallmark of the Institute and ensures patients benefit more quickly.

The HonorHealth Research and Innovation Institute combines innovation and collaboration to bring tomorrow's cure to patients, today. Helping patients navigating difficult health journeys all over the world, the Institute has become a patient destination for treatments often unavailable anywhere else.

The Institute supports and oversees all medical research at HonorHealth—from cancer and cardiovascular disease to neurological conditions, traumatic injuries, COVID-19 research and more. A research program this robust is rarely seen at a community hospital system. Since 2005, the Institute has created dynamic momentum by pushing the boundaries of medical knowledge to drive breakthrough discoveries that improve, extend and save lives.

In fact, patients from all 50 states and two dozen countries have visited the Institute to discuss individualized treatments with its medical teams. HonorHealth has attracted some of the most distinguished physicians, leading scientists, researchers and clinical teams in the nation operating within a unique hybrid academic model that offers patients personalized medicine, innovative treatments and new drugs and devices that are under development.

With the help of donor generosity, partnerships with prestigious universities, research facilities and pharmaceutical and medical device companies, the Institute moves well-being forward in more ways than you can imagine. As one of the nation's foremost research organizations, The Institute embraces innovation to improve medicine and change the future with solutions focused on bariatrics, cancer, heart and vascular health, neurologic and spine conditions and trauma.

Research that spans multiple specialties benefits our community and patients across the world.

CANCER

The Research Institute is home to one of the nation's leading early drug development programs—a distinction normally held by large academic medical centers. Since 2015, first-in-human clinical trials here have been key to the FDA approval of more than two dozen new cancer treatments. These studies provide our community with early access to potential advances before they are available in routine practice. Continuing to raise the bar, the Institute offers more early-phase cancer clinical trials than any other Arizona cancer center. In 2020 they opened 23 new cancer trials and by the end of the year oversaw 111 active studies with 66 of those open to enrollment.

HEART AND VASCULAR

HonorHealth is taking action against cardiovascular disease, which affects nearly half of American adults. The Institute has contributed to the FDA approval of several cardiovascular devices and treatments and is a leader in offering new therapies. In fact, the Institute was first in the Southwest and second in the nation to implant an MRI-safe pacemaker allowing more efficient care for patients who need scans as part of their continuing health journey. Additionally, clinical trials here facilitated FDA approval of a new form of anticoagulant that doesn't require frequent blood testing for patients at risk of developing blood clots.

COVID-19

Responding quickly to the COVID-19 pandemic, HonorHealth Research and Innovation Institute reviewed approximately 110 study projects from pharmaceutical companies across the world in 2020. Several studies offering potentially lifesaving therapies were ultimately launched, with more than 2,000 patients considered for investigational treatment and more than 1,500 patients treated through their COVID-19 clinical trials.

The Institute's renowned physician-scientists give patients access to groundbreaking therapies, trials and the latest medical devices, along with a great deal of hope.

"Our focus in the Research Institute is making differences for patients right here and right now," states Mark Slater, PhD, CEO of HonorHealth Research and Innovation Institute. "We are probably best known for our work in developing cancer therapies. Often the very first people in the world to try these treatments are done right here in Scottsdale at the Institute."

*Celebrating Michael & Heather
Greenbaum on 40 Years of Service
and Friendship to HonorHealth*

“I was a math nerd with just enough courage to show up for a group blind date with students from the all-girls’ college down the road,” Mike Greenbaum reminisces on the defining moment of his freshman year of college. “We paired up by height,” he laughs.

It may not be the typical way to find a spouse, but it seems to have worked for them. More than six decades later, he still speaks of his wife Heather with love and admiration.

"We have always been a team," he explains. "When I started my options trading firm in Chicago in 1975, I was working very long hours. For more than a year, Heather stayed back in New York to maintain the school schedules for our three kids. She worked very hard as well."

That hard work paid off. Mike applied his exceptional mathematical expertise to build the largest Quant fund firm in the world. But that success came at a price, and the self-described "workaholic" desperately wanted to spend more time with Heather and their three children, Jordan, Julie and Jason, raising them with the values instilled in him by his own parents. So, in 1982, he retired early and they chose Scottsdale as their new home, with a plan to spend more time with the family and enjoy the Valley's perfect weather.

NEW HOME, NEW CHALLENGES

Just two weeks in their new Scottsdale home and Heather had the kids enrolled and ready to start at their new schools. Mike had to make a quick trip back to Chicago to wrap up some business and was already on an early flight when ten-year-old Jason arrived for his first day of school. He was the new kid in an unfamiliar place. But the playground felt familiar. As he took his turn on the monkey bars, what should have been a simple fall turned frighteningly complex: a severe femur fracture.

"The school nurse called me to come pick him up," recalls Heather. "I was terrified. Michael was away, we were in a new city. I had no idea where the nearest hospital was." For some reason, an ambulance was not available, so the school nurse directed them to what was then called Scottsdale Memorial (now HonorHealth Scottsdale Osborn), where Dr. Samuel Kaplan was the orthopedic surgeon on call. While he was examining young Jason, Heather desperately tried to reach Mike.

"I got her call and jumped right back on the plane to Phoenix." When Mike arrived at the hospital, Dr. Kaplan explained that Jason had sustained an extremely complex fracture. While the surgery was successful, recovery would require years of monitoring to ensure the leg would maintain full function as he grew. Dr. Kaplan promised to be with them each step of the way.

Thus began an enduring relationship with HonorHealth, one marked by the themes woven through their lives: hard work, courage, loyalty, generosity, service.

ROOTS OF SERVICE RUN DEEP

The Greenbaums hold fast to their Jewish heritage and the mitzvah of tzedakah is one commandment the family holds especially close. *Tzedakah* is sometimes translated as "charity," but the Hebrew meaning is more nuanced, encompassing the gift, the recipient and the social justice that results from that gift being put to use in the world. Philanthropy in the spirit of tzedakah builds trusting relationships and recognizes contributions of time, effort and insight.

There may be no better word to encompass the contributions Mike and Heather have made to improve healthcare for our community throughout their 40 years of friendship and service to HonorHealth.

"This covenant is very important in my life. When one is able to do so, they should help others," Mike explains simply.

OUT OF CRISIS, A HIDDEN BLESSING

During Jason's long recovery, the Greenbaums developed warm friendships with Scottsdale Memorial's CEO, Dr. Art Nelson, and other hospital leaders. They introduced Mike and Heather to community members who wanted to see the hospital succeed and grow. The two attended a fundraiser at the home of Herb Cummings, a respected ambassador for the hospital who went on to become the Foundation's first board chair in 1984.

“We were very impressed with the smart and generous people there, who were focused on making the hospital the very best resource for the community,” Mike recalls. “We quickly recognized that people before us made that hospital what it was, and it was a blessing to us when we needed it most.”

That year, Mike played in the hospital’s charity golf tournament and then chaired it the very next year. With his leadership, the tournament grew from a small, nine-hole event for doctors to a two-day tournament that has since raised several million dollars for the hospital.

Heather herself played an important role in starting Playing for TIME, a women’s golf, tennis and card tournament that raised several million dollars over its 20-year history to support HonorHealth breast cancer services. She also became very active with the Arizona Humane Society, extending her caring concern to the lives of animals as well.

As they learned more about the needs of their new community, Mike became active with the Foundation. As Foundation board chair, he proposed a \$10 million campaign to fund a surgical center on the Osborn campus, a fundraising goal considered improbable. He and Heather stepped forward to make the hospital’s historic first million-dollar gift and challenged friends to join them. Within a year, they had reached that seemingly impossible goal. In gratitude for their leadership, the hospital named the building the Greenbaum Surgical Center at Osborn.

LEADERSHIP LEADS

“We only support causes we are connected to, where we are involved.” Mike proved that again and again over the next several years. He chaired the hospital board of directors, served multiple terms as a Foundation trustee, including five years as chair, and championed generosity to advance healthcare. His leadership roles often became his full-time job, as the hospital planned for expansion while facing the complexities of a changing healthcare environment.

Amidst these difficulties, the Greenbaums proved a steadying hand once again. Their generosity to the Scottsdale Healthcare Endowment ensured funding in perpetuity for what is now HonorHealth Scottsdale Shea Medical Center.

Service to HonorHealth and the Foundation has earned the Greenbaums a front-row seat to many notable milestones, including the Honor Ball, opening of the Virginia G. Piper Cancer Center, planting the “North hospital” and the merger with John C. Lincoln, which led to the creation of the six-hospital HonorHealth system.

One particular memory Mike holds dear is meeting Nancy Reagan, honored guest for the ribbon cutting ceremony at the new Shea campus.

“To host the First Lady, whose own father was a physician, and show her the new hospital, was very exciting. I think that was a moment that inspired the entire team and helped us understand the importance of what we had accomplished.”

40 YEARS OF LOYALTY

Since 1983, the Greenbaums have made a charitable gift to HonorHealth every year, without fail. Their 40-year history of consecutive giving is unmatched.

“We just decided to be out front on all the campaigns, to support everything we could,” Mike says.

What compels such loyalty?

“This is a very special organization,” says Mike, noting the dedication of physicians, board and staff to improve healthcare and the quality of the entire organization. And it is a place where the Greenbaums have built life-long friendships.

A SHINING BEACON

Today, with their loving, 59-year marriage, three successful grown children, eight “exceptional grandchildren” as Mike likes to say, and a life full of meaning, the Greenbaums continue their legacy of tzedakah, setting an example of generosity for new leaders and philanthropists of the future.

“HonorHealth is a community hospital like no other, a shining beacon in our community!” Mike says proudly. “It has all the resources of a larger hospital system—a Research Institute, nursing magnet status, exceptional care for cancer, neurosciences, cardiovascular and many other conditions. This only happens when people make a commitment to the hospital and realize how important it is to pay it forward.” ●

people love their doctor but are frustrated by the lack of timely access. After waiting weeks for an appointment, it may take even longer to get the results of basic tests and screenings.

Through **HonorHealth Concierge Medicine at Legacy**, patients can establish an extraordinarily close relationship with their doctor and the entire care team. Our concierge physicians limit their practice to just 400 patients, which allows them to provide tailored care that's designed specific to need. Services include:

- 24/7 access to your physician, 365 days a year
- Extended appointment time
- Care navigation that includes scheduling consults, imaging, lab appointments
- A dedicated and direct number
- Onsite lab for all your lab orders

Jessica Ellsworth, MD, who has practiced in the Scottsdale community for the past 15 years, is the first physician practicing in the HonorHealth Concierge Medicine program located at 18801 N. Thompson Peak Parkway, in Scottsdale.

"The concierge concept is appealing to both primary care physicians and their patients," says Dr. Ellsworth. "I think we would all like to connect with a more holistic and personal relationship with the individuals entrusted with our health. This appeals to patients who



have very busy lives and want to use their time in the most efficient manner. They want a provider who sees them, knows them and is available with any healthcare concern."

Shorter wait times and quicker access to physicians are the most popular reasons patients consider concierge medicine. But many find that the consistent, individualized attention from the doctor also amplifies a better understanding of patient medical history, thus making it easier for them to detect and treat health issues.

Dr. Ellsworth noted, "Being able to focus my attention on a small number of patients gives me the time to really connect with them. I can provide them continuity of care even if they are traveling. This opportunity has given me needed time to focus on my patients."

One of Dr. Ellsworth's patients expressed her gratitude by saying, "Isn't it great to go to a doctor who knows everything about you; is there for you; cares for you and can make a difference in how you see medicine in this new world going forward?" ●

Living in New York City in the 80's, she was introduced to philanthropy and became involved with National Foundation for Children with Learning Disabilities, MS Society, Boys and Girls Club and American Collegiate Golf Foundation. Before long, she was serving on and even chairing some major events.

Her desire to serve, however, blossomed in her youth. As a teenager, she volunteered as a candy striper at the Children's Hospital in Berkeley, Calif., where she took great joy in helping the children and making them smile and laugh. It also reminded her that there is hope for those who are ill.

Moving to Scottsdale as a newlywed in 1997, Laurie was asked to be on the Heart Ball Committee, where she made several new and lasting friendships. She has also served on boards, committees and events for Childhelp and Reigning Grace Ranch. She is admired throughout our community for her graciousness and positive attitude.

It was at one of these charity events where she met fellow philanthropists Mike and Priscilla Nicholas, who introduced her to HonorHealth Foundation. Laurie took office on July 1, becoming the first woman to chair the Foundation's Board of Trustees. When asked about what she hopes to accomplish during her term, she shared her vision for collective impact.

“It's a tremendous honor to be asked to serve in this way. I would like to see the board more personally involved. The more you learn about HonorHealth, the more impressed you are with our quality of doctors, the varied services we provide to our community and the outcomes and hospital experiences we provide. We have a great story to tell, and we need to share it with our friends and the community.”

For Laurie, that story is simple:

An extraordinary couple helps patients across the country by developing a physician symposium focused on comprehensive neuroscience care

Through the generosity of Tom and Keven Jones, there is now an annual meeting that serves as a passport to life-saving comprehensive healthcare for

patients across the country: The HonorHealth Neuroscience Symposium.

Through the Jones' personal mission to constantly improve the care available to patients navigating complex neurological conditions, they have created a community that inspires advanced, continuing education for the higher good of patients, and physicians, across the country.

In talking with Tom, you can hear his passion for all things related to neuroscience and the life-changing advances in the field over the past 50 years. His introduction to the need for more comprehensive

neuro care was, sadly, related to family medical issues. His first wife, Carmen, and three of their four children dealt with neuromuscular challenges that eventually took their lives too soon.

Unwilling to simply accept the typical care of the time, he quickly immersed himself in learning more and doing more to advance the neurosciences in his community. He joined the Brain Research Foundation, an affiliate of the University of Chicago, and over time filled the role of president. During his tenure there, he helped develop the formation of a Scientific Advisory Group to help researchers and doctors realize funding for their research projects.

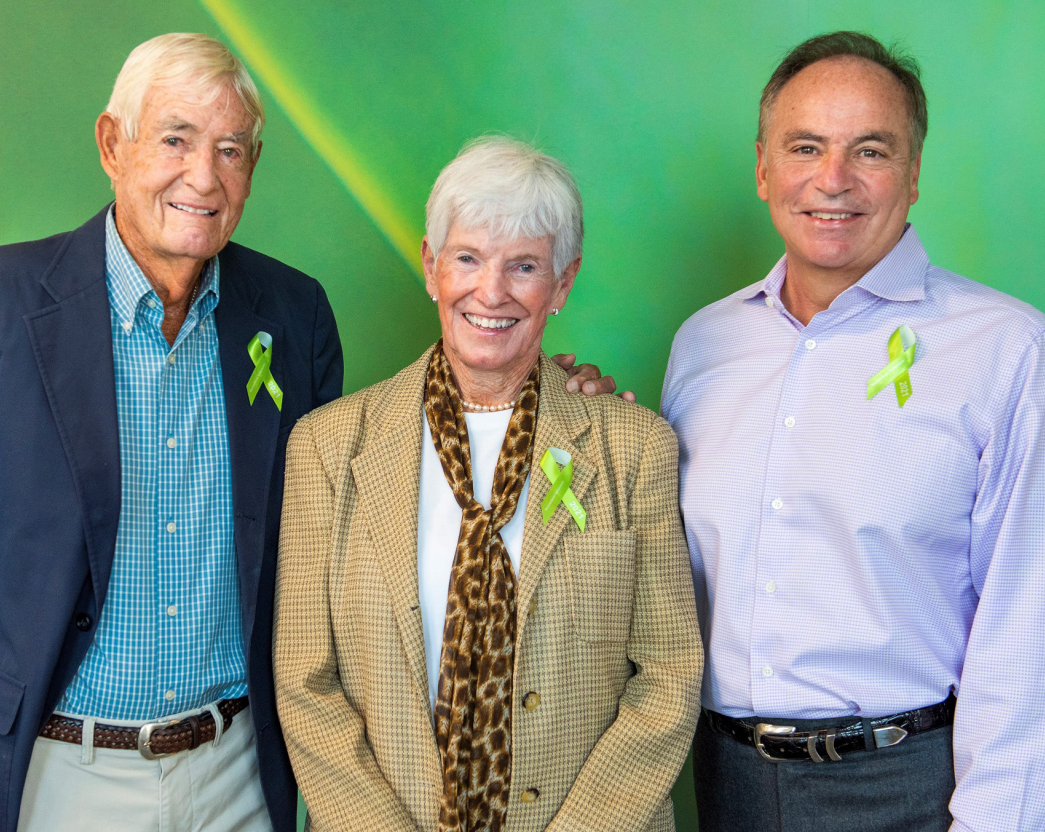
"Selfishly, I wanted to learn more about new specialties related to neurosurgery and muscular dystrophy. My wife and I needed answers, so we sought genetic counseling," Tom offered. "At the time, it was new and helped us find an answer, but the medical knowledge was not there to deal with the root cause or to help alleviate the medical challenges. So, my passion to help my family really ignited this lifelong pursuit into being."

Having a role in building a strong network within the Chicago research community, when his role as an executive of Harris Trust moved him to Arizona, he was immediately recruited to the Barrow Foundation by Dr. John Green, former director of the Barrow Neurological Institute. Tom eventually served as President of the Barrow Foundation, which led to an introduction to HonorHealth Foundation, where he served as Board Chair for three years (just one of his many roles) and began a lifelong partnership to help drive philanthropy, innovation and patient care.

Tom remarried and when his wife Keven needed serious spinal surgery, they turned to HonorHealth's Dr. Frederick F. Marciano, PhD, FAANS, at the Bob Bové Neuroscience Institute.

"I was saved from chronic back pain thanks to Dr. Marciano," stated Keven Jones. "Other specialists read the MRI and reported nothing could be done, but Dr. Marciano reviewed it and knew exactly what to do, and with his surgical expertise, my pain became a thing of the past; this is why we need a place to share best practices."

Forward to 2020 when Tom and Keven give a transformational gift through HonorHealth

Foundation to help realize the Neuroscience Symposium at the HonorHealth Bob Bové Neuroscience Institute, located at the Scottsdale Osborn Medical Campus.

This two-day hybrid educational event is a cross-functional collaboration between HonorHealth's neurosurgeons, intensivists, neurologists, neurovascular interventionists and other noteworthy speakers to provide innovative, state-of-the-art and evidence-based practices that not only prepare clinicians for what they will face in the world of neurological disease, but also enable them to earn continuing education credits, certifying their expertise. To date, the Jones' have underwritten two Symposia, in 2021 and 2022, with sessions offered in person and remotely for physicians across the United States and Canada.

"My goal is to help keep HonorHealth the best nonprofit community hospital," states Tom. "I have a great deal of respect for HonorHealth—how it is

run, the quality of the people and the enthusiasm of the medical staff. Any time I'm at a medical campus for anything, including care, I always ask the nurses how long they've worked for HonorHealth and their level of job satisfaction—every time they answer enthusiastically and that makes me happy and proud."

This year's Symposium immersed 125 attendees in the most current practices for today's complex neurological patient population while providing alternative and experimental education in patient care from 25 guest lecturers, including nationally recognized expert in brain and spinal cord injury, Nicholas Theodore, MS, MD, FAANS, FACS, who performed a robot-assisted spine surgery on a cadaver during his seminar "Engineering the future of spinal surgery."

"What I loved about the Symposium is hearing about how gratefully and enthusiastically the caregiver attendees were for this educational opportunity and also that I had the chance to talk with the physicians outside the clinical setting," remarked Keven. "The demonstration on the spinal care technology was fascinating. The science has come so far!"

Extraordinary gain is often led by the passionate and committed visionaries on the ground, of which Tom and Keven Jones are prime examples. It is through their compassion, guided by experience, that HonorHealth is taking the lead in elevating care for neuro patients. ●

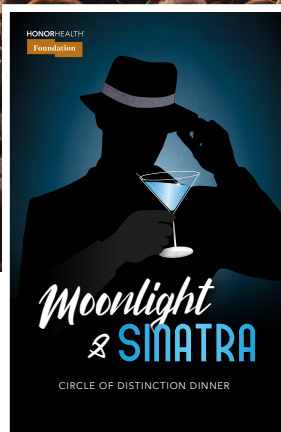
Q: What do you want our readers to understand about patient needs in cardiovascular care and how philanthropy impacts that?

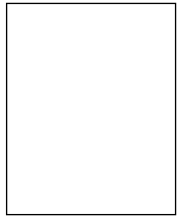
